

But Daniel stopped him from entering and pointed to the floor. It was covered with the footprints of small and large feet and all led to a secret door under the altar. They went down and found the remains of the food that had been eaten by the priests, their wives and their children. Cyrus was furious. He had them all put to death and the statue broken into pieces.

There was another god that the Babylonians worshipped. This was a great and fierce dragon. Every day it would come out from the forest to be fed. One day Cyrus said to Daniel, "This time you cannot say that this is not a living god."

"It is living," said Daniel, "but it is not a god. If I have your permission, I will kill it without sword or club." Cyrus challenged him, "If you can do so." After the Roman Emperor Augustine had established the iron and clay kingdom, he appointed Herod the Great, the King of Judah to rule Palestine. That was the time when the Son of God Jesus Christ was born. And finally, the rolling stone that became bigger and bigger became the kingdom of God established by Jesus Christ - the kingdom for all peoples and the kingdom that never ends.
